Schedule of events:

Friday Sept. 2: arrive and set up. Our camp will be located in the City Park (Eleanor Park in Google) under the trees in a grassy area. See directions.

Saturday Sept. 3: Informal Living History Encampment with Battle in the afternoon. We will go off site to a fun battleground to the west of town. Easy walking distance. Exact time to be determined. Informal skirmishes and skits in camp very much *encouraged* all weekend but must coordinate with commanders and event coordinator.

Sunday Sept. 4: same as Sat. above.

Monday (LABOR DAY) Sept. 5: We will join in with the town's Parade to help them honor their Veterans of all wars. A fun and different scenario has been worked out so that we can (safely) have a short skirmish DURING the parade. You won't want to miss the fun! One army will begin the parade only to be ambushed by the enemy half way through. A skirmish will ensue in the streets of the town ending with both armies scattering and regrouping at the end of the parade route and walk together as the Finale to the parade. The town is SUPER EXCITED to have us.

Directions: J-90 in Spokane Take Pines Rd exit in Spokane Valley (highway 27) South. Continue South through towns of Mica and Freeman. Near town of Rockford turn LEFT onto highway 278. (this road turns into #58 when you hit Idaho border). At the 4 way stop in Rockford town center turn RIGHT and head south again. You are now heading towards the Coeur d'Alene Casino. Just before the Casino you will need to exit to the right and get onto Highway 95 south towards towns of Worley and Plummer. Proceed through Worley. At town of Plummer turn LEFT onto Highway 5 towards St. Maries. This is a beautiful drive along the south end of Coeur d'Alene Lake. Just before town of St. Maries there is a Cemetery on your right on a hill. To the left, across the street near the Mullan Trail monument will be our battlefield for 2 battles. Continue down hill into town. Just past the Big Paul Bunyan statue you will turn LEFT on to 15th Street. Go straight North on this street and it will take you into the back side of Eleanor Park which is commonly known as the City Park. As soon as you see grass look to the right. We will be camping under the trees to the right on the South side of the park. If you Google Directions put in "Eleanor Park, St. Maries, ID." this will try to make you drive through a swimming pool though. Use it as a guide only. ;) St. Maries is aprox. 50 miles south of the Spokane Valley.

Tieton Highland Days

August 27-28 (One battle each day and a small skirmish Saturday evening)

Tieton (Tie-a-ton) is a very old celebration in what is called the "Highlands" of Yakima Valley. The town was established predominately by Scottish emigrants 130 years ago. It is on the western edge of the Yakima Valley towards White Pass and Chinook Pass. This will be the second year that members of the Washington Civil War Association will help them celebrate.

Aye...Laddie!...Bagpipes and kilts galore. There will be Celtic music from visiting bands! There will also be a variety of other things going on. As you can tell, this is not a "Civil War" event only. They have set aside an area for our camp to do living history (in the shade). We have a fairly large grassy battlefield with an orchard on one side for movement and flanking. The schedule may be modified up or down a little bit but here is the plan. We will have a battle on Saturday about 11:45 right after their parade. We will also (carefully) have an evening battle about 7:00 (sunset) in the field and orchard next to camp. There will be one battle on Sunday to commence at 11:45 AM and folks can break camps and head home about 1:00 P.M. The city of Tieton is providing facilities for us and a \$500 fund for our attendance. The first \$50 will go to the W.C.W.A. and the rest being donated to the attending units in the most reasonable manner possible. I hesitate to advertise this as an event bonus but the town also will have a beer tent Saturday night and, well, these Scottish people like their beer....best I can tell! There is a limit on fire pits so please get hold of me ahead of time if you plan to attend so that we can make arrangements for additional firewood, etc. We had approximately 23 reenactors last year and are confident that we will have more this year. If you can't make it to Fort Stevens or you just want a fun little event to attend, please come.

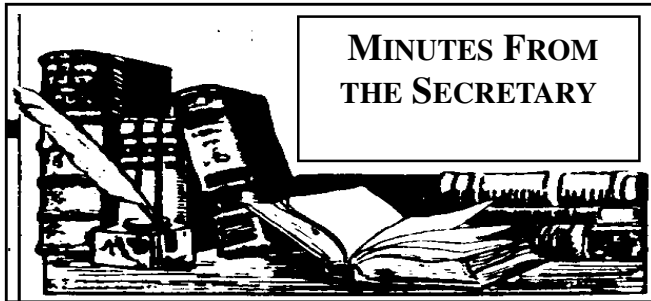

**MINUTES FROM
THE SECRETARY**

WCWA Board of Directors Meeting Minutes
July 9, 2011

G. A. R. Cemetery, Snohomish, WA

Unofficial until approved at a subsequent meeting

I. Call to Order. Meeting was called to order at 10:49 by Chairman Al Myers. Meeting was delayed due to the lack of a quorum until that time.

II. Roll Call was made by Secretary Kevin Saville. All Administrative Board members were present except Tobey Gulley, Ted Sayler, and Erena Heino. For the General Board, on the Confederate side, there were seven unit representatives and two proxy representative present (nine total). On the Federal side, there were four unit representatives and three proxy representatives present (seven total). The total eligible voting representatives was 16 out of 29.

Initially, we did not have a quorum. A suggestion made to ask for replies to the meeting notification email so that we will know who plans to attend so as to better attain a quorum. Unofficial meeting discussion proceeded but notes were not taken. Topics included

- 1) Disciplinary sanctions for a Port Gamble moving violation (A. Myers),
- 2) VMI battlefield participation (D. Lynam),
- 3) VMI gun theft and solicitation for replacement (CB Zohn with M. Heino email), and
- 4) VMI raffle prizes (CB Zohn).

The meeting commenced at 10:49 a.m. when a quorum was attained.

III. Secretary's Report was made by Saville. The unofficial June meeting minutes were published in the July Dispatch. The June minutes were approved as presented without a motion.

IV. Treasurer's/Membership Report was given by Treasurer Anna Flores. The Fort Steilacoom event remains \$3,372 negative. Spokane is currently \$5,556 positive but the bills for portapotties and the engineers are still not received; estimate the final will be approximately \$3,000 positive. Port Gamble is currently \$1,095 positive, estimate the final will be \$800 positive. Flores said both Fort Steilacoom and

Port Gamble had significant help expenses (\$2,100-2,400). The overall financial picture for this point in July looks good. Memberships continue to rise, as of July 8 there were 905 members; at the end of last year, there were at 930. New members this year now total 254. Flores said we are catching the wave of the 150th Anniversary here in the Pacific Northwest.

V. Brigade Commanders & Civilian Leaders Reports

Confederate Civilians: Linda Myers had nothing to report.

Federal Civilians: Erena Heino reported via email to Kevin Saville, "Thank you to all the Federal Civilians for all of your hard work and dedication to making Port Gamble a great event. We enjoyed the beautiful view, our fine neighbors, and talking with the public. Mrs. Erena Heino, Union Civilian Community Leader." Federal Brigade: No report.

Confederate Battalion: No report.

VI. Committee Reports.

A. Event Planning & Activities:

Plain. Howard Struve said he has talked with Graham Watson regarding the October 1-2 event. Struve assured Watson that we're still coming and that everything is in order. Watson made nice color event promotional cards to advertise the event; Struve has approximately 1,000 of those available to distribute to members. Watson hopes for 3,000 spectators and is working closely with Leavenworth so that people will go to both events—the first weekend of the Leavenworth Oktoberfest and the Plain Civil War reenactment. Doug Clark and others will be working with Watson to advertise the event in the area. Watson told Struve that if anyone wants to stay late, that will be fine as the potties will be there a couple more days. It will be okay to stay an extra day or two, he will be happy to host those that wish to stay. Watson is a Civil War buff and is very excited about this. He has a barn that should be empty and he will turn it into a Saturday night musical event.

St. Maries, Idaho, Paul Bunyan Days, Labor Day weekend. Struve said the event committee has reviewed the application and the event will be voted on at next month's board meeting. It will be voted on as a sanctioned event because it is going on the WCWA calendar and will be receiving WCWA insurance. Myers said a motion is not required ahead of time to vote on the event at the next meeting.

VII. Unfinished Business.

Vote on new unit, the 2nd South Carolina Volunteer

Infantry. A. Myers said we need to vote on accepting the unit as there was a motion at the last meeting. John Caverly said he moved to accept the unit. Tony Lee read the unit history by Matt Wyckoff, a historian in the east. The 2nd S.C. participated in as many, if not more, battles than any other regiment on either side. It is one of the few units that was established before the bombardment of Fort Sumter and existed until several weeks after Lee's surrender at Appomattox. It established itself as one of the elite shock troop units of Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. Two officers, Joseph Kershaw and John Kennedy, became generals and one man, Richard R. Kirkland, became one of the most famous "common soldiers" of the war for his humanitarian efforts at Fredericksburg.

Company I, Palmetto Guards (whom they plan to depict) was organized on June 28, 1851. This Company was ordered into state service on December 27, 1860. It was probably the first unit on either side to be activated for the war and one of the most famous companies because of their role at Fort Sumter as well as subsequent service with the 2nd South Carolina.

From their position on Morris Island, Edmund Ruffin pulled the lanyard on a cannon this company manned to fire the first shot toward Fort Sumter. Company I departed for Richmond on May 9, 1861 and mustered into Confederate service on May 22, 1861. The men came from the low country around Charleston and Beaufort. Tony Lee said Edmund Ruffin's claim to firing the first shot is a disputed claim. Needless to say, Company I has along and proud history. **Motion to accept the 2nd South Carolina (made by Caverly at the June meeting) was seconded by Dave Lynam.**

Nathan Alred asked how many members, Lee said at least eight rifles and ten men. **Motion passed unanimously, 16 in favor.** Myers said the 1st Louisiana will be the 2nd's mentor unit.

Other June Meeting Motions. Myers said the other two motions from the June meeting will be postponed to the August meeting because they haven't been published in the Dispatch very long. Those motions call **for 1) rotating an event's camp locations (N. Alred) and 2) not accepting a sponsored event on the calendar for a third year after two consecutive years of \$500 or more loss to the WCWA (B. Starr).** John Caverly said he will move to table the second motion

indefinitely.

VIII. New Business.

Election Coordinator Appointment. Myers said there needs to be an election coordinator appointed (as specified in the Bylaws). John Caverly volunteered to head the election committee. Myers said that the election coordinator can have other people help him. John said he will acquire a balanced committee. Myers said that nominations open the first of September and close at the end of September. Ballots should be mailed out in the first week of October and elections close at the end of October. Ballots may be available at Plain and get more votes that way (assuming ballots can be properly distributed at the event).

VMI Raffle and ("Quaker") Musket Theft. C.B.

Zohn gave a prepared speech that was met with general acclaim from the audience. C.B. thanked all of those that helped with the raffle at Port Gamble. There were \$160 in raffle donations and \$9 other donations. Proceeds will go to support the VMI and their huge needs list. Eight pre-rolled, and filled, cartridges (1 pound of FFg powder) will be raffled at Ferndale's Saturday morning parade. There will be a separate, general raffle for other things on Sunday, to include a carpet bag and flag case. C.B. thanked everyone for the Port Gamble battle scenario with the VMI, just prior to the actual battle. C.B. also reported the theft of ten rifles from their camp at Port Gamble. Mike Heino sent an email describing the theft and that the Mounted Rifles have agreed to fund replacement of one rifle (\$15 from sutler). Heino challenged other WCWA units to do likewise so that the VMI's guns can be replaced without having to spend money they are earning for tents and other items.

VMI Battle and Swivel Gun. Dave Lynam said he wishes to discuss, at the next board meeting, the VMI "Battle" at Port Gamble and the swivel gun that was on the field during that VMI battle. Lynam reports neither are consistent with the Bylaws. **Safety Rule Update for Engineers.** John Caverly said they plan to propose an update to the WCWA Safety Rules regarding the technology for the engineer's processes. For example, they are not digging holes any more. Saville recommended, and Myers agreed, that they should write up a proposal and submit it to Myers.

Treasurer & Membership Task Assistance. Anna Flores asked the voting members to split up the job of treasurer/membership. Flores said it's a horrendous job that she would not be doing this second year without Beth Sier as an assistant. It's a considerable amount of

work. David Imburgia asked what she proposes, to create another Administrative Board position? Flores said we (Administrative Board members) don't vote on issues but we could create another administrative position. The secretary and membership person would need to communicate well between each other and ideally be in close geographic proximity. Imburgia said if the position is voted on, someone from some distance could be voted in to the membership position. David asked if it made more sense to authorize an assistant. Flores said she may not want to be forced to find an assistant. Flores said there's many things about the position that make it complicated. Beth Sier said the membership person could be the take-in person, and then the treasurer could proceed to do the work. Imburgia said it sounds like an assistant treasurer position. Caverly said a secure website may help. Flores said we kind of are doing that right now via spreadsheets that they create and share, but they still have paperwork. Sier said if we did a database, the only person to do it would be the membership person or the treasurer. Sier said if she was voted into the position, she would want checks sent to the treasurer or if she could deposit checks, she would deposit them into account and retain a photocopy. She would prefer to have checks mailed to the treasurer. Sier said it would be simpler if one person did each job. Caverly said there could be more technological refinement. Myers said it would be a constitutional change to add another Administrative Board position. Flores said she spends 5-6 hours per week doing the membership stuff and we are still archaic in terms of needing paper. Imburgia said we are discussing two different issues. Saville said it sounds like an administrative assistant position is needed that would be an appointment. Flores said it would be necessary to have people send memberships to the assistant. Bernie Muskowitz suggested that an addition to the Administrative Board would have to be voted on at the General Membership meeting in February, but the election for next year is this year. If you could get together to define what's important for the treasurer and membership then that could be published. Sier said if the membership position was made an Admin Board position, could it be put on the ballot? Myers said no, could not approve the position and vote on a person to fill the position at the same time. **Dave Lynam moved that we authorize the treasurer to appoint an official administrative assistant for membership.** John Caverly seconded the motion and asked to amend it, that this position be a part of our

regularly recognized list that needs to be filled every year. David Imburgia said that's covered and called the question. **Motion passed with 10 yes, 0 no, and 5 abstentions.**

IX. For the Good of the Order.

A. Past Event Reports.

Port Gamble. Howard Struve said the weather and ground was much better this year. There were good crowds each day. He said he didn't have CSA registrations but estimated 250 to 300. There were 340 Union reenactors registered. Struve said he spent Father's Day weekend working on the event and Alred worked the weekend laying out the Confederate camp. Overall, it worked out and everyone seemed to be happy. Struve said people worked together to make it happen. Civilians put up sandwich boards and Victorian lighting. There were crowds throughout the whole place. The navy, down the hill, had several hundred people through the camps. The wood was better and the town was very happy. Struve said a rumor circulated that we are not going back next year. He knows that the event coordinators, Gene Knight, Shelly Butterfield-Knight, and he did receive email from Port Gamble on the subject. The "town" does not get any tax revenue, it is privately owned by a developer group. There is no city council or mayor, just a company that owns the town. Their way of making money is from festivals and weddings; they have done weddings successfully for many years. They also rent out houses for businesses. For their festivals and reenactments numbering six to seven during the summer, they want to raise the rental rate to \$10,000. We usually replace a wedding for the weekend so they can't make that money. Sometimes they lose on the weekends. For the festivals, Port Gamble is willing to lower the rate from \$10,000 to \$8,000. Historically, we have spent from \$2,500 to \$4,500 for the site. The last couple of years it has been \$3,500. Struve said they are asking the WCWA \$8,000 for next year. This year's gate was \$11,330 so we will make \$800-900 this year. We will lose a lot if we pay \$8,000 for the site. Struve's opinion is we just won't do the event if the charge is \$8,000. Bob Ballard said we can't raise the cost to the public; Struve said we charge the public \$10 per adult and \$5 for youth. Struve said we plan to counter the proposal and see if they will accept, if not then we will not have the event. Struve said we will not charge our membership to participate.

B. Upcoming Event Reports.

Veterans Memorial Museum and Steam Train at Chehalis July 16-17. Saville spoke on the event and had information packets available. The focus is on living history presentations for the public. Camp setup can begin on Friday, during the day for the civilian area and after 5:00 for the military camps. Camps are open all day Saturday and Sunday. Skirmishes will occur at 2:30 both days. Steam train rides at 1:00 both days are open to reenactors in period dress. This is the first of a number of encampments planned in association with the Veterans Memorial Museum.

Ferndale/Hovander. David Imburgia said the logistics are under control. Three out of four of the last years have been bad weather. The band and caller have canceled so they want to switch to a lyceum/talent show and use \$250 to pay for a talent contest. Unless there is an objection, the event coordinators will earmark money for the talent contest. Flores said the budget is set and the event coordinators can use the money as they see fit. Imburgia said that N. Alred will be the coordinator of the lyceum.

C. Unit Reports.

U.S. Medical Department. Pat Pietsch said that Dave Lambert is retiring from command of the Medical Department. He will remain emeritus chaplain. Lambert is transferring responsibilities to Russ Hicks.

D. Announcements.

Military Honors Committee. John Caverly said a committee is formed to look at military honors and they request input. Bernie Muskowitz asked to be included.

Fort Lewis Proceeds. A. Flores said she is still waiting to hear back from John Strand regarding Fort Lewis money. We are hoping to get the second \$500 to the WCWA.

Hovander School Event. Dave Lynam said he received money from the Hovander Farm school event will distribute the money accordingly.

North Fort Lewis Lt. Wilkes, U.S.N. Event July 5.

Bernie Muskowitz said a number of folks participated in a North Fort Lewis event for Lt. Wilkes, dressed in pre-civil war attire.

X. Adjournment. Meeting was adjourned at 11:47 a.m. by A. Myers.

Next Meeting is August 13, 2011 at the Snohomish G.A.R. Cemetery Hall.

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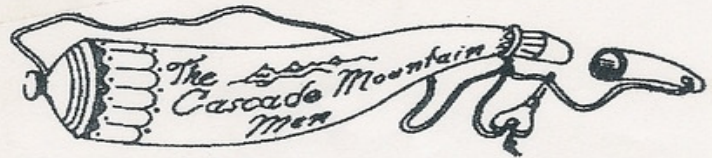
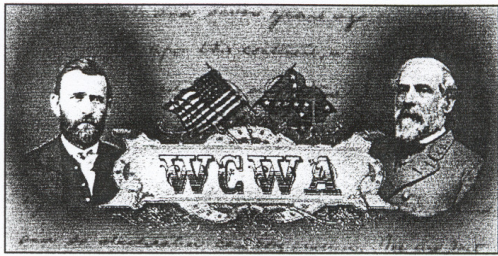
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
