**Port Gamble site:** This re-enactment (camps and battlefield) will be located in the town of Port Gamble. This unique jewel has preserved its historic character throughout the years since 1850's. ### Edmonds 4th of July Parade

Rally 'round the flag, boys! The Edmonds Patriotic 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade wants YOU! Federal, Confederate and civilian re-enactors are cordially invited to strut their stuff at the Edmonds 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade, Edmonds, WA.

Edmonds is a beautiful town with charm and beauty... like your hometown before the war. The Edmonds 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade is a wonderful family event drawing thousands of spectators along its one-mile route. Bring your colors! Bring your ladies and your children! Bring your recruiting material! You may distribute flyers and recruiting posters to the spectators along the entire route, and in City Park after the parade.

City event planners have asked us to demonstrate the nine-step loading and firing drill in City Park after the parade. The infantry unit that volunteers to do the load/ fire demonstration will receive \$20 in compensation for their powder.

Last year, the WCWA won top honors in this parade, and parade

officials have asked us to please come again. They are promoting the Washington Civil War Association in their press releases and on the City's website. Plus, Claire's Restaurant (3<sup>rd</sup> & Main Street) is proud to offer a 10% discount that day to re-enactors in period dress. So, let's have a great showing and a great time with family and friends in Edmonds.

Musicians—please add your fife and drum beat to the parade.

**Check-in begins at 11:00 A.M at 7<sup>th</sup> Ave. (between Glen and Daley).** (See directions below.) Participants must be in the assigned staging area by 11:30 for judging. The main parade starts at noon. Distance: approx. 1 mile.

Nine-step loading and firing drill takes place at City Park at approximately 1:30 PM. Stay and enjoy the annual Firefighter's Invitational Waterball Competition immediately following the WCWA loading and firing demonstrations.

**Directions to the Edmonds parade check-in site:** From I-5, take Exit #177. Follow SR-104W 3.0 miles to 100<sup>th</sup> Ave. W. Turn right (North) and go 1.8 miles to Caspers Street. (Note: 100<sup>th</sup> Ave. W. becomes 9<sup>th</sup> Ave. S. and then 9<sup>th</sup> Ave. N. as it crosses Main St.) At Caspers Street turn left (West) and go one long block to 7<sup>th</sup> Ave. N. Turn left and go two blocks to the check-in booth. Park right of the centerline and send a representative to the booth to get our unit number and final instructions. (With normal traffic, it's about 18 minutes from I-5.) Our staging

area will be assigned at check-in and will be on one of the streets which border the nearby Civic Center playfields.

#### Directions to Port Gamble.

On I-5 Southbound towards Tacoma take Exit 132 to Hwy. 16/Gig Harbor/Bremerton. Hwy.16 merges into Hwy. 3 South of Bremerton at Gorst. Hwy 3 merges onto Hwy 104 just past the HOOD CANAL BRIDGE. Port Gamble is approximately 1 ½ miles east of the Hood Canal Bridge.

Northbound on I-5 towards Tacoma: Take the SO. 38 ST. exit-EXIT 132- toward GIG HARBOR / Hwy.16/ BREMERTON. Stay in the left lane as it parallels with I-5 and then crosses under I-5 and merges with Hwy. 16.Hwy.16 will merge into Hwy. 3 South of Bremerton. Hwy 3 merges into Hwy 104 just passed the exit to the Hood Canal Bridge.

**DO NOT CROSS OVER THE HOOD CANAL BRIDGE.** Port Gamble is approximately 1 ½ miles East past the Hood Canal Bridge exit. Travel distance: In Tacoma, the junction of I-5 and Hwy. 16 is only 51 miles from Port Gamble.

**NOTICE:** For those considering the Washington State Ferry system as an alternate means please be aware that black powder is NOT allowed on the Washington State Ferry system. Participants planning to use the WSF should consider taking the AM boats to Kitsap County due to 2-3 hour waiting period because of summer/weekend travelers. WSF will charge higher fees for vehicles with trailers.

#### Brigade and Civilian Camps.

Campers will be allowed to set-up on Friday AM. Campers are wel-

come to stay overnight on Sunday. Checkout time is Monday, June 27, 2005 at 12:00 pm. Keep vehicles and trailers on designated drive aisles in camps. Out of courtesy for other campers, once your vehicle is unloaded please remove your vehicle to designated re-enactor parking area. If possible, please do not leave your vehicle in camp overnight. Exception is granted to arrivals coming into Port Gamble after 9:00 pm. All vehicles need to be removed from camps before 7:30 am Saturday. Vehicles will be allowed in camp after 3:00 pm on Sunday, June 26<sup>th</sup>. Out of respect for others, vehicles will not be allowed in camps from 7:30 am Saturday through 3:00 pm on Sunday. If you need to leave early before the event is over or arrive during the event, please park your vehicles on Puget Way or View Drive to unload/load your gear. Camps are located next to these roads. As you leave the event please do your best to place your garbage in the dumpsters and/or garbage cans. Thank you.

#### Sutlers.

Sutlers will be allowed to arrive on Thursday afternoon for set-up. Checkout time is no later than Monday, June 27, 2005. Please contact Shane Colglazier e-mail address is cretetard@cs.com if you are planning to attend this event.

#### Registration.

Registration will begin Friday, June 24, 2005 at 1:00 pm. The registration table will be located at the intersection of Puget Way and View Drive.

#### Camp Setting.

Port Gamble has large grass areas which is more than suitable to hold a re-enactment. All grass areas are maintained throughout the year.

#### Modern Camp.

Modern camp is located within Port Gamble. See the map link on the website for more details. Please contact Shane Colglazier at cretetard@cs.com if you are plan-

ning to camp in the modern camp area.

#### Re-enactor Parking.

Re-enactor parking is within Port Gamble at the Old Mill Site. See map. Please do not park your vehicles on the streets near the camp. Street parking areas are designated for spectators and visitors.

#### Water.

Water is available at locations marked on the map.

#### Wood.

Wood will be provided for this event.

#### Fire Pits.

The town of Port Gamble will allow fire pits. Please remember to remove all garbage prior to filling in the fire pits once the re-enactment is finished.

#### Amenities Information.

Port Gamble General Store will have on sale, bags of ice, assorted beverages, some food stuff (picnic type items), gifts and other miscellaneous items. In addition, there is a small café/deli located at the back of store which serves breakfast, lunch and dinner everyday and my personal favorite – ice cream. Store hours are from 8am-9pm.

## Summary of Proposed Changes to WCWA Bylaws, Safety Rules, and Safety Test

### WCWA Bylaws.

**Section I**, Event Rules and Regulations. Para. 2, CHANGE "Powder Monkey" to "Position Number 5." Para. 4, ADD reference to WCWA Artillery and Cavalry Safety Standards, in addition to WCWA Safety Rules. DELETE Paras. 9-11, related to drugs, alcohol, and smoking (in Safety Rules).

**Section J**, Camp Rules and Regulations. DELETE Paras. 5 & 6, related to discharge of weapons near powder and camp areas, (in Safety Rules).

**Section M**, Horses and Riders. Para. 1, ADD reference to WCWA Safety Rules and Cavalry Standards. DELETE all other content (in Safety Rules).

**Section N**, The Battlefield. Para. 1, ADD reference to WCWA Safety Rules. DELETE Paras. 6-12, 14-18, & 21 related to infantry, artillery, and cavalry rules (in Safety Rules).

**Section O**, Rifle and Pistol Safety Rules. Para. 1, ADD reference to WCWA Safety Rules. DELETE all other content (in Safety Rules).

**Section P**, Artillery Safety Rules. Para. 1, ADD reference to WCWA Safety Rules and Artillery Standards. Para. 4, CHANGE "Powder Monkey" to "Position Number 5." DELETE Paras. 9-17, related to artillery requirements (in Safety Rules). Para. 18, delete "Infantry Guns." DELETE Para. 19, reference to Artillery Standards (added at Para. 1).

**Section Q**, Edged Weapon Safety Rules. Para. 1, ADD reference to WCWA Safety Rules. DELETE all other content (in Safety Rules).

### WCWA Safety Rules.

**NOTE:** The following changes are made TO the *unapproved* Safety Rules previously submitted by the Safety/Risk Committee. CHANGE "guidelines" and "stan-

dards" to "rules" throughout document.

### General Behavior Rules.

Para. 5, referencing smoking locations, DELETE Item F, within 25 feet of caissons, and ADD to Item E, within 25 feet of ammunition chests. (Ammunition chests are located on caissons, and perhaps elsewhere, and are what need to be avoided while smoking.)

DELETE Para 7: "Colors or standards must be surrendered if the bearer is captured...." (This is generally not a safety item and is covered at length in the Bylaws.)

DELETE Para 12: "Handle your weapon as though live ammunition were being used. Weapons are defined, for the purposes of this document, as Civil War period black powder weapons." (Pointing weapons at opposing forces in mock battle is a contradiction to gun safety.)

Para. 16, referencing water and fire extinguisher at camp fires, CHANGE to "A bucket of water or fire extinguisher must be accessible at every camp fire."

Para. 17, referencing putting out candles and banking camp fires, CHANGE to "Open flames (candles and campfires) must be attended at all times."

Para. 18, referencing sutler fire extinguishers, CHANGE to "Sutlers must have a fire extinguisher in their tents."

Para. 19, referencing night watch weapons, CHANGE to "Weapons must not be carried while on night watch."

### General Battlefield Rules.

Para. 6, CHANGE "Minimum safe distance in front of a long arm or side arm is 50 feet, with a clear cone of fire 30 degrees from the muzzle" to "Minimum safe distance in front of a longarm or side arm is 50 feet." (Considered impractical to gauge and measure a 30 degree cone.)

Para. 7, CHANGE "Artillery will not fire when troops are in front of the blast cone and are closer than

75 feet” to “Minimum safe distance in front of an artillery piece is 75 feet.”

Para. 10, DELETE “Skirmishers firing from a kneeling position must keep the 50 foot distance rule in mind and the cone of fire if casualties are in front of you.” (This is redundant to Para. 6 that applies to all long arm and side arm use.)

Para. 15, DELETE “Note: For any suspected back, neck, spine, or head injury—DO NOT move the injured person.” (Considered a greater WCWA liability risk to document medical first aid procedures; someone not trained does not necessarily know how to suspect a back, neck, spine, or head injury.)

**First Aid.**

DELETE entire section. (Considered a greater WCWA liability risk to document medical first aid procedures.)

**Weapons Safety Rules—  
Longarms.**

Para. 4, DELETE “Powder flasks can only be carried at backcountry events and only for loading pistols.” (Pistol requirements follow later.)

**Weapons Safety Rules—Pistols.**

Para. 5 MOVED to Para. 2 to precede wad requirements: “There are only two proper and safe re-

volver loads recognized by the WCWA. They consist of:

—Black powder, foam wadding, then grease - in that order.

—Black powder, then Cream of Wheat - in that order.”

**Artillery Safety Rules.**

Paras. 3 & 13, DELETE “/ Legion.” (“Battalion” commander is the term used in all documents.)

Para. 11, DELETE safety container requirements. (Safety containers are not used.) Will read: “Artillery powder charges are to be kept within the ammunition box until ready to be used. When ready to transport a charge from the ammunition box to the cannon muzzle each charge must be placed in a leather haversack. The charges are then carried to the cannon where they will not be removed from the leather haversack until they are to be placed in the cannon muzzle.”

DELETE Paras. 14 & 15 relating to artillery pieces being inspected with radiography, x-ray, or magnifying as well as using that as grounds for denial of use of piece. (Reportedly never done.)

Para. 20, CHANGE “very wet” to “damp” for correct condition of sponge when swabbing.

**Ground Charges and Air Burst Safety Rules.**

DELETE all existing rules and replace with the following, received

from Bob Landon:

General Rules

1. It is the responsibility of the Engineer Corps to place the ground charges and to see that the air bursts are clear of trees or other overhead obstructions with the exception of special effects charges which must be supervised by an Engineering Officer and accompanied by Engineering Safety Officer. Personnel who have not attended the morning safety meeting may not set charges or operate the ignition box except by special permission by the Safety Officer.

2. Ground charges will be placed in a safe manner, secured to the ground and marked. The wire is to be secured to the tube. Remote control igniters are to be used whenever possible to eliminate wires strung on the ground.

3. A safe distance from an exploding ground charge is 5 feet. Do not look directly into the ground charge container or touch any part of it or the wires. The exception being for special effects interaction with the ground charges by troops on the field. Such special effects must be coordinated between the Company Commander of the troops involved and the Engineering Commander and Pyrotechnician. All such stunts must be rehearsed and approved by an

Engineering Safety Officer.

4. The Engineer Corps shall have approved fire fighting equipment available in case of fire. Equipment may consist of Forestry Approved Water Pumps, shovels, or Pulaskies.

5. There is nothing fired from the ground charge tubes that should effect anyone outside the 5 ft. safety area except for special effects (See #3 above). If aerial bursts are used ground forces should watch for falling paper.

6. When ground charges are in place on the battlefield there will be an Engineer nearby at all times. If he/she must leave the area for his/her own safety, the ignition boxes will be disconnected rendering the ground charges inoperable. Any artillery position changes on the field should be coordinated with the Engineer nearest to the battery so that he/she does not fall within their 75 ft. field of fire.

7. The only objects besides the powder charge and igniter in the ground charge may be sifted flour or peat moss. Peat moss and/or grass are used only in open pans for special effects.

8. Aerial rockets may only be used under supervision of a state-licensed pyro-technician. (DELETED mention of who pays for services.)

9. When developing a scenario involving ground charges, the Engineer Safety Officer, the Commander of the Engineers and the Battalion Commanders need to approve the plan. There will be an Engineering Safety Officer at each end of the field during the battle.

10. The number of charges that can be transported onto the battlefield should be sufficient to carry through the battle, including salutes, and will be decided upon by the Event Coordinator and the Engineers.

11. Proper sequence for setting up a ground charge is:

a. Place ground charge tube in a

location approved by an Engineering Officer and fasten it securely to the ground to prevent it from being accidentally disturbed and mark its position with a Ground-charge flag

b. String wire, making sure it is not attached to an igniter box and that the box is turned off

c. Connect wire to black powder charge and place charge in tube

d. Attach wire to firing device as instructed by the officer in charge

12. Each ground charge pack should be 2 oz. of black powder.

13. If a misfire occurs verify the wire is connected to the firing device, then try again. If a second attempt fails, disconnect wire from the firing box, roll it up as soon as possible and check it out after the battle. If reloading, check the tube first. Return charges to the Safety Officer after the battle for proper disposal.

14. After the first battle of the day, take tubes back to camp, place in a secure position on the field or tip tubes upside-down in place so they will not leave holes in the ground. After the last battle of the day, retrieve the tubes, fill any open holes, roll up the wire and, after checking to make sure there are no smoldering patches of grass, paper or other debris, return to camp. Return any unused ground charges to the Officer in Charge.

#### WCWA Safety Test.

##### General Exam Questions

Q7, CHANGE Answer B to: when handling black powder, after battle muster, during battle, after battle until weapons are cleaned, within 25 feet of ammunition boxes or chests.

Q10, DELETE "with a 30 degree cone of fire" from all answers.

Q11, CHANGE artillery "safety boundary (safety cone)" to "minimum safe distance in front."

DELETE Q24, relating to when colors or standards must be given up. (Addressed in Bylaws, generally not a safety issue.)

Q29, CHANGE to "A bucket of water or fire extinguisher must be accessible at every campfire."

Q30, CHANGE to "When you leave your campsite unattended you should put out all candles and fires."

DELETE Qs 31-37, relating to First Aid. (Considered a greater WCWA liability risk to document medical first aid procedures.)

#### **Artillery Exam Questions.**

Q8 & 9, CHANGE "Powder Monkey" to "Position #5."

Q10, CHANGE "Damp all the way through" to "Damp." (Relating to sponge wetness. "Damp" is the correct answer.)

#### **Engineer's Exam Questions.**

Q1, ADD to answer A, "yes, if ignition box is disconnected" (Relating to if ground charges can be left unattended—this is the correct answer.)

Q3, CHANGE answer B from "fine sifted flour or green grass" to "sifted flour or peat moss." (This is the correct answer.)

Q6, CHANGE answer C from "the minimum number for that battle, plus salutes" to "the number sufficient for that battle, plus salutes" (Relating to the number of charges permitted on the field; this is the correct answer.)

Q8, CHANGE "How much powder IS in each ground charge pack" to "How much powder SHOULD BE in each ground charge pack?"

Q10, CHANGE "If using below ground level tubes, what do you do with the tubes and wire after the battle?" to "What do you do with the tubes and wire after the last battle of the day?"

Meeting Notes  
14 May 2005, 10:00 A.M.  
Snohomish G.A.R. Cemetery Hall**

**I.** Meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chairman Dan Rike.

**II.** Secretary Kevin Saville called roll and requested company reports. Administrative Board: Dan Rike, Gil Bridges, Kevin Saville, Rusty Starr, and Linda Mount were present. Cindy Easterson, John Persinger, and David Hames were absent. John was represented by Gretchen Persinger.

General Board: 11 voting representatives were present, consisting of 4 U.S. and 7 C.S. companies. **VOTING COMPANIES NOT REPRESENTED:** 4<sup>th</sup> U.S. Infantry, 28<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts, 125<sup>th</sup> Ohio, Army of the Columbia Fife and Drum Corps, U.S. Medical Department, 1<sup>st</sup> Louisiana Zouaves, 4<sup>th</sup> Alabama, 7<sup>th</sup> South Carolina, 43<sup>rd</sup> Virginia/Mosby's, Cobb's Battery, C.S. Medical Department, and Polk's Battery.

**This DID NOT constitute a quorum so the official board meeting was closed.** Reports were not received, nor given, for companies and committees. No decisions were made. Dan Rike announced that we would go around the room for announcements.

**Announcements at the Meeting.**  
**C.S. Civilian Leader, Spokane, Displays.** Rusty Starr reported Linda Mount is stepping down as Civilian Coordinator for the Confederacy and thanked Linda for all her work and efforts. Rusty said he has asked Rachelle Hamaker to take over as Civilian Coordinator; she accepted the position and will work with Linda to take over. Regarding Spokane, Rusty spoke with Terry Mourning and things are looking

really good. Some construction will be going on near the event; email Rusty for directions on the shortcut route. They are expecting a really large crowd and there will be lots of publicity. Rusty said the club and collection display was at the Snohomish Historical Museum but is now removed. It went over real well and they want a bigger display next year. They reported they had the best attendance since the museum was opened. A lot of fliers and information was passed out on upcoming events. Unfortunately, last weekend there was not as good of turnout in Snohomish. Only Bruce Smith and Rusty were there; four people (members of the public) came in to see the display. Corky Savoie indicated there was a breakdown in communication; she didn't know anything about it.

**Col. Persinger Report.** Gretchen Persinger reported for John Persinger that Anthony Monson and she are representing the brigade today. Anthony will be adjutant again. The Colonel's status unknown for Spokane. On Tuesday, a blood clot went from his leg into his lungs, causing pneumonia. Gretchen said he will be fine; he's supposed to come home today but it may be tomorrow. Spokane is less than two weeks away so they don't know for sure what will happen. Capt. Keene (Ted Saylor) has accepted a temporary brevet promotion if necessary. There was a good brigade showing at the Honoring Their Memory Ceremony.

**Rainier Event.** Ted Saylor reported he met with Tim Shaw on publicity for Rainier. They are hoping to get more people there for the event; the NCWC is planning for greater support. One change is to get the sutlers down to the road for easier spectator access and swap parking lots so spectators are parked where the reenactors were.

**Port Gamble Event, Free Signs.** Howard Struve reported the Port Gamble event contract has been signed by both parties. Publicity is coming along really well for the event. The website is looking good, thanks to Linda. Howard said there is good support from the Issaquah and Gig Harbor Boy Scouts for the event. Dan asked about the horse issue; Howard said he emailed Tim with the findings. The outcome is we don't have to haul manure off site but will have to stack it. Howard said the Bremerton

Armed Forces Day will be used as publicity for the Port Gamble event. Corky got six signs made for free; there was a round of applause for the signs. The 20<sup>th</sup> Maine will be at Port Gamble June 11<sup>th</sup>. Regarding ferry transportation, Howard said to be careful. Bill Lewis said if weapons and ammo are separate, he thinks it would be O.K. Howard said it should be o.k. per an Olympia ruling but he doesn't know what a state trooper may say. Lyle Gleason commented that any powder in bulk should be brought around by the bridge. Someone asked about publicity, as to how far west of Port Gamble is information going? Harold indicated they are setting things up in Port Townsend, Sequim, and Port Angeles. Dan Rike suggested if you're going on the ferry, you should have your membership card and a folded flier for the event to help justify the things you are taking on board.

**Tall Ships Event.** Lyle Gleason reported Linda Mount has joined the Navy. Lyle said the Navy wishes to have the WCWA withdraw sanction status for the Tall Ships Festival because the U.S.S. Tahoma members plan to participate under NMLHA auspices instead. Lyle said the reason for this is a couple of rules in the WCWA Bylaws that they do not intend to comply with. First, the mountain howitzer is not an approved gun. Second, the three-minute (between shots) rule would preclude a 19-gun salute for the Governor in a reasonable period of time. With one gun, 57 minutes would be the fastest they could fire; with two guns, 28.5 minutes. Lyle said John Persinger, the Tahoma Marines, and others from the WCWA wish to participate but do not plan to represent the WCWA at the event.

Those wishing to participate need to contact Lyle for coverage under NMLHA insurance. Dan Rike indicated once we submit this as a WCWA event in the calendar and to the insurance company, if participation is requested to be canceled we should create an actual procedure so it doesn't appear the board's doing this on an emotional basis. The fact that it's been publicized puts the club at risk at this point without the proper notification for cancellation. Dan would like to see what an attorneys say about the proper procedure so we don't get exposed to unnecessary risk.

It would likely have to be brought to a motion, seconded, passed, and posted to the club once or twice before adequate process was achieved for cancellation. Lyle said the City of Tacoma, State of Washington, and Governor's Office are all planning on their participation. He said they would need about 12 guns to reduce it to a five-minute window to get the shots off. Gil said they should have declined the request and contacted a military reserve unit to do this with modern artillery equipment. Dan said as an example, the 14<sup>th</sup> Virginia Cavalry could plan to hold an event and have it publicized as a WCWA-insured event. Then a movie contacts them and says they want to film some stunts. At that point, we would have a dilemma because there are WCWA safety rules we have to follow that conflict with what the movie company wants. We may need to address this in other situations as well. Dan repeated that he would like to contact an attorney to see about withdrawing a sanction, as he is concerned about what the proper notification procedure should be.

**Lakefair Parade.** Kevin Saville announced that the Lakefair Parade is still on the calendar for July 16, without a coordinator and with a May 30 deadline looming for entry. An additional insured binder is required for the event. Kevin asked if the parade is needed for advertising the Rainier event; Ted Sayler said they will hit the Tenino parade on July 23 and that should be sufficient; it will not matter if we are not at Lakefair. Dan advised Kevin to put the status as pending, depending on the event cancellation discussion with attorney.

**Website.** Linda Mount spoke on the website job application motion passed at the previous board meeting. She said in her opinion, the WCWA website is seen by people all over the world and the posting of job information would not help its image. She proposed a WCWA members-only page that is possible to do with the server that we have. Additional information could be put on that page that's of no interest to nonmembers, such as the Bylaws changes, meeting minutes, etc. Access could be granted with a password. Linda requested a software upgrade that would permit making some improvements; the

cost would be \$200 for the current software. Tim Shaw said Linda has done wonderful things with the website; for \$200 we couldn't spend better money. It was discussed that we have \$300 in the budget for the website so we gave Linda verbal approval to purchase the software update. Linda publicly acknowledged John Lande, her boss, for permitting Linda to work on the WCWA website at work. There was a round of applause.
